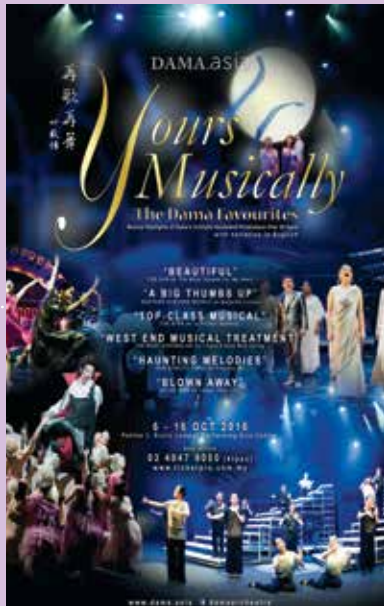

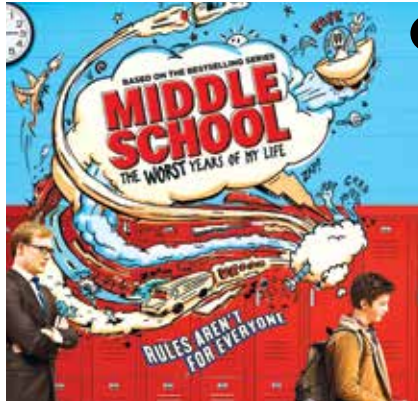

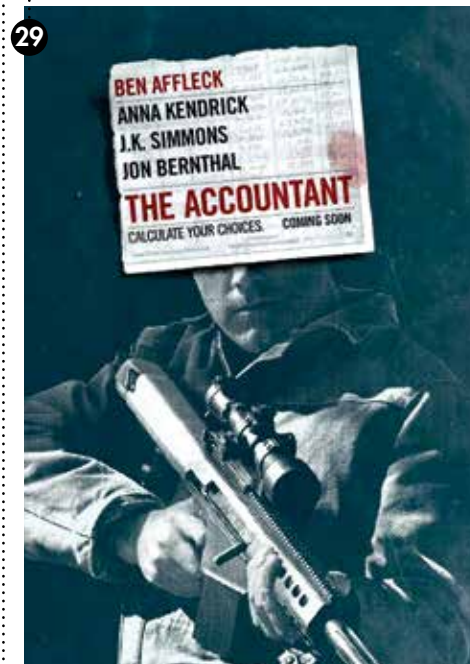

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KLAS CELEBRATES ITS 5TH ANNIVERSARY

Since opening its first gallery in February 2011, KL Lifestyle Art Space (KLAS) has carved a distinctive name in the vibrant Malaysian art scene, having promoted and sold over two thousand artworks by established local and regional artists including several renowned masters.

It was during Henry Butcher's inaugural auction at Bentley Hall in Petaling Jaya that chief executive officer of KL Lifestyle Art Space, Datuk Gary Thanasan, decided to get into the art business. The glaringly visible interest shown by the art buyers who were bidding during this never-before-seen art auction drove him to decide on that very Sunday, that he was going to open a gallery and an art auction

house. The next day (Monday) after the auction hosted by Henry Butcher, he gathered his team for a meeting and the rest, as we know it, is history.

KL Lifestyle Art Space first opened its doors at Tropicana City Mall in 2011, with the intention of launching art auctions by the next calendar year.

"Our main objective of opening this gallery is to give due recognition to Malaysian artists, primarily to our senior and established artists who have been under the radar for quite some time now – especially so with those who have not been recognised as much as their contemporary counterparts," said Datuk Gary Thanasan during the inaugural speech at the official launch of KLAS in 2011.

True to keeping its promise, after merely one and a half years and relocating into a flagship gallery in Jalan Maarof, Bangsar, KLAS hosted its first art auction in the third quarter of 2012 – the Inaugural Indonesian and Malaysian Modern & Contemporary Art Auction at Nusantara Ballroom, Sheraton Imperial Kuala Lumpur.

The second KLAS auction dubbed “The Malaysian Modern & Contemporary Art Auction 2012” sold over RM2.4 million worth of artworks, achieving over 90% in sales from 108 artworks. It was evident during this auction that Malaysian art aficionados started to take a keen interest in the auctions hosted by KLAS.

The interest surged steadily during the third auction, during which sales catapulted and surpassed the RM3 million mark, with over 92% in sales garnered.

In 2014, Singaporean artworks began making its way into the KLAS art auction, which in turn opened KLAS to a new market of art buyers in Singapore. This new interest of buyers from across the causeway gave KLAS an opportunity to reach out and educate them on Malaysian art.

This year, after close to five years of hosting successful auctions, KLAS is not showing any signs of slowing down. KLAS expects the same streak of success, if not more. KLAS continues to organise and host auctions up to six times a year and boasts having transacted over 1,800 artworks to-date, placing KLAS comfortably as Malaysia's number one auction house.

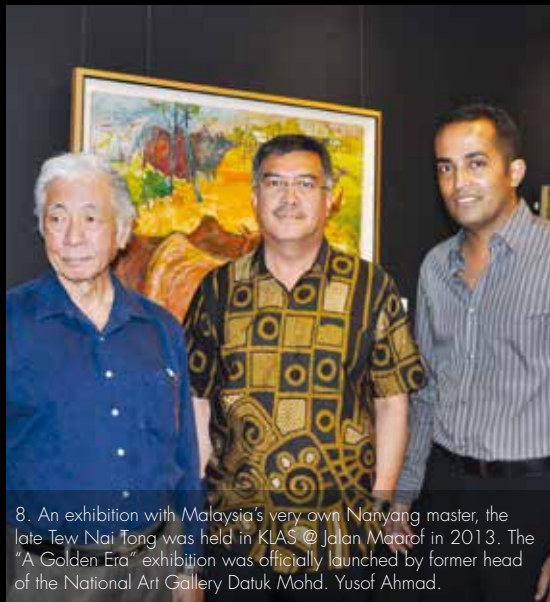

MANUEL GUZMAN HERNANDEZ

AMBASSADOR OF THE BOLIVARIAN REPUBLIC OF VENEZUELA TO MALAYSIA

In conjunction with the upcoming 11th Venezuelan Week and the commemoration of 30 years of Diplomatic Relations with Malaysia, we took the opportunity to speak with His Excellency on the highlights of the event this year and his personal journey from being a journalist in his country to being an ambassador of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela to Malaysia.

Ambassador Manuel, I am truly honoured for the opportunity to interview you. Since you have been serving in Malaysia for 10 years, what would you say is the highlight of your working experience here?

Well, it is a fantastic experience to represent my country here in Malaysia, so it is a very nice experience because I think the embassy has achieved some goals in terms of the relationship between both countries and one reason is to guarantee the continuity of the Venezuelan Week, which is in its 11th edition this year and we are the only country that remains to hold such an event annually.

What made you come to Malaysia?

OK, I was no diplomat but I was a journalist. I had a friend who called me to help out in the ministry in the communication area. Actually, when he asked me to help out in one embassy in Asia. My initial thoughts were of my family and how was I going to suddenly leave everything behind and work in Asia. He insisted that I start thinking about Asia, so I checked the Internet. When I told my wife, as expected, she didn't believe me at first and thought I was joking. After some research online and testimonials, I decided to take up the offer because I wanted to explore and understand how to be of service to my country and learn more about Asia. I was happy to have made that decision and thought I was only going to be here for one year. After one year, the government promoted me to become ambassador and I was very happy with the outcome of the whole thing. I found that it was easier to travel from Malaysia to everywhere else in Asia. It was an easy transition, thanks to the kind Malaysian people and modern facilities. I do my best in helping to strengthen the relationship of my country with Malaysia.

Funniest or peculiar encounters with a Malaysian or in Malaysia?

You see, my English is quite limited. I remember when I was supposed to address a letter to the King and to give a speech. I am not a big fan of making speeches but in my position, it was inevitable. There I was making a speech to His Majesty and I remembered clearly the expression he had as he tried hard to understand what it was I was saying. His protocol team also wore quite perplexed looks on their faces as they were trying to decipher my sentences. Their expressions were entertaining. It was an experience I won't forget, luckily I met with His Majesty afterwards to explain it clearly. I was quite embarrassed but it was funny as I recall the occasion.

Have you picked up any Malaysian habits?

I fell in love with food and football. As a vegetarian for more than 40 years, I found that living in Malaysia, it is a food paradise with my lifestyle choice. It would certainly be more challenging in Venezuela when meat is a staple. Football, on the other hand, is one of my most favourite things to do. I play with some friends and our team is called the Grasshoppers. This sport definitely makes me feel more Malaysian.

As the 11th Venezuelan Week is just around the corner, what do you most look forward to?

My Malaysian side is definitely excited over the Gastronomic Festival which is happening at Hotel Impiana KLCC and due to popular demand, we are reinventing Chef Tamara Rodriguez. I look forward to tasting another successful fusion dish that combines the best

of Venezuelan and Malaysian flavours. Next, would be the book launching with the support of the Malaysian Institute of Translation and Books (ITBM) for the first time we will be having a Spanish-translated novel that we hope will unite us further. This year, we will also be having a Venezuelan harpist, Leonard Jacome, performing at Dewan Filharmonik Petronas.

The itinerary mentions that there will be a Venezuelan novel that will be translated into Malay. Could we get the name of the novel and the reason why it was chosen?

The title of the novel *Doña Barbara* that was written by Venezuela's first democratically

elected president, Rómulo Gallegos. It is a classic novel that touches on the transition from rural to new. This novel is one of Venezuela's literary treasures and we are excited to share it with our Malaysian friends. This year, we will also be introducing an anthology featuring six writers comprising of three Malaysians and three Venezuelans in collaboration with ITBM. The anthology will have three translations which are Bahasa Melayu, English and Spanish. It will be available in all major bookstores after the launch on Oct 20.

What are your hopes for the relationship between our two countries when we are celebrating 30 years of diplomatic relations?

I hope for further development in the economy for both countries, explore the potential in energy, housing and latex. Malaysia plays an important role in that aspect. I hope for the business opportunities to further grow and have both Venezuelans and Malaysians open and run more businesses.

What message would you like to impart to Venezuelans visiting Malaysia for the first time and those who choose to live here?

I recommend a lot because Malaysia is a safe country, friendly and attractive. We have fantastic beaches in Venezuela but just in case that nostalgia hits, Malaysia too offers many beautiful beaches to visit. Of course, talking about food, you will be able to find all kinds of food from Thai, Indian, Chinese to European and many more. Food is definitely a reason to visit or stay in Malaysia.

SOULed OUT Ampang

Eat your heart and soul out

Other outlets include KL (Hartamas), Bangsar, and Kota Kinabalu.

Known for their beautifully laid-out al fresco dining, this two-decade-old chain is still standing and rockin' the live band and mojito-drinking scene. If you live in places like Bangsar, Hartamas and Ampang, you must have come across this chain of restaurants.

Effortlessly and flawlessly known to serve the best mojito in town, the atmosphere in this place is ideal for lounging around with friends and family for hours. SOULed OUT serves numerous cuisines. They include Asian (Chinese, Malay, Northern Indian), Western and Italian food. As we visited them prior to lunch, we were ready for our tummies to be filled.

We tried the Cheese Nachos as a starter. We've been told that a lot of people come here for this, so we thought we'd try it. It features what any nachos would. The freshness of the acidity from the jalapeno peppers, together with the salty-goaty flavour of the cheese, the sharp kick of the salsa, and the warm-crunchy tortilla chips are sure to deliver you a flavoursome starter.

I surprised myself by trying their mesmerisingly colourful Summertime Salad. I would take meat

over greens any day, but you just have to look at the perfectly decorated bowl of salad and you'll be tempted to dig in. It's tossed with a mixture of seafood comprising grilled salmon and prawns, crunchy lettuce greens, homemade thinly sliced capsicum vinaigrette, dressed with juicy orange slices and finally topped with alfalfa sprouts. The sharp, sweet, acidic, salty and tangy flavours combined gave a wholesome bowl of fresh goodness.

Their two-decade-old Fried Beef Noodles is still an Asian favourite amongst the customers here. It looks and tastes similar to the traditional Chinese "Kong Foo Chow". Traditionally fried with prawns, pork or chicken and tossed with both yee mee (Cantonese egg noodles) and kuay teow, it is served with generous beef slices, flat rice noodles (kuay teow), and topped with spring onions and ginger here at SOULed OUT Ampang. It is then topped off with the usual smooth egg gravy.

Alternately, the Sirloin Steak was another noteworthy dish that we tried during our visit. The thickly-cut succulent Australian beef was delivered to us on a lip-smacking decorated dish, served with vegetables of the day

and some freshly roasted new potatoes. We paired our juicy chunks of the steak with some peppercorn sauce and it was certainly lip-smacking. You have the option of complementing your steak with mustard, garlic or mushroom sauce as well. This signature dish has been bringing back droves of people to this joint. So let's face it, how could you resist a meaty Australian hunk?

By this point, we were ready for some sinful sweets. If you're a fan of Haagen-Dazs, you'll be pleased to know that most of the desserts here are spiced up with the ice cream. Fancy something with a hint of both hot and cold? Dig into their baked Lava Cake and you'll be content with the hot molten praline oozing through the moist chocolate cake before it merges with the cold vanilla ice cream. For something closer to home, wander through their giant bowl of ais kacang with a choice of vanilla, strawberry or chocolate ice cream.

Now lets talk some alcohol, shall we? Party people, the Guinness Shooters need to be your must-drink to kick off your night. Served in an ice-filled boat are 10 shots of party

goodness; lychee liquor, lychee pieces, a shot of Guinness whipped up with some whipped cream. Manja @ Old Malaya

Passion on a Platter

I am ashamed to admit that it was my first time driving up to Old Malaya. As I parked my car at this beautiful colonial building and took in the panoramic view of traditional architecture, it felt like I was standing in history. Old Malaya is an understated treasure trove that houses a number of dining venues, namely Manja, Kapitan Bar, Pampas and 1919 Bar. You have to appreciate the imaginativeness that the name Manja inspires (especially for those familiar with the local language). It is derived from the word in Bahasa Melayu which means pamper. For all its utility, the name suggests something casual and cozy, but the experience is full-on indulgence from interior to plate.

Seated in the lush cushion chairs and we gazed at the table setting. We were surprised to feel rather comfortable in such a luxurious environment. Definitely an ideal place for dates as the dim lighting sets the mood and illuminates each dish perfectly.

Going through the menu was a rather nostalgic experience as we spotted many Malaysian favourites including pisang goreng and teh tarik ice cream (a contemporary approach of course). Just reading it brought back memories of lazy Sunday evenings with the family, before we were so consumed with the digital age. However, each came with a unique twist to the dish that adopted elements of modern and contemporary culinary innovations that

were discovered during the travels of proprietor, Navin Karu along with his head chef, Chef Vic. Keeping the freshness and differentiating themselves from others, they rely on local produce and make almost everything themselves from sauces, breads to the stocks. As time-consuming as it may be, it is clear that their sights are set on showcasing the purity of the flavours to pamper their patrons with the best dining experience.

Naturally, our waiter took our order without a note and pointed out that most of the dishes were made for sharing. But chances are, you will want to savour it for yourself.

The concept of the menu is simply a layering of different flavours. Speaking of which, we noticed that most of the dishes that we had, have quite a bit of Japanese influence, especially with the use of fresh tuna which tasted just as good as it looked. Maximise your experience with their creatively concocted cocktails that bring back fond memories of growing up in Malaysia. These are the Kopi Ping Martini (vodka, khlua and espresso kopi ping ice-cream), Spirit of Borneo (tuak, lime, elderflower and egg white) and Taman Mezcal (vodka, mazcal, lychee syrup, blue berry, mint, lime wedges, sugar and gingerale).

Back to the food, our starter began with a rather unexpected dish, Paneer and Mango. This dish would be best

described as vibrant, fresh and delightful. As someone who loves cheese, I found that the paneer had the perfect texture that complemented the fresh arugula.

Next was the Bayam and Escargot; you'd regret not ordering this on your visit. The presentation was inviting while the flavour was mind-boggling.

If Popeye (90's kids will understand) were to head into a fine dining restaurant for his spinach, we'd point him to Manja. In fact, if you want to get your child to take an interest in eating spinach, you should bring them to Manja and try this dish (it's that good) .

Three of my favourite ingredients were found in the Tamarind Salmon and Yellow Fin Tuna which featured beautifully sliced salmon, avocado and tuna that was laid on top of risotto rice. A light yet hearty meal which I would have happily consumed all by myself.

Another favourite from the entire course was the Rastali Fritters with Teh Tarik ice cream which, as mentioned earlier, reminded me of Sunday evenings with the family when we had pisang goreng and teh tarik, though this rendition made more sense with the Malaysian weather and was robust in flavour.

Manja is truly a culinary destination that anyone who appreciates culture and food would enjoy. Go ahead and Manja yourself.



Salt and Paper Pork Ribs

Its name tells you or suggests exactly what it's trying to implement. This two-month-old joint brings you fresh and eclectic tastes through its European inspiration accompanied by a minimalist and rustic atmosphere.

Are you someone who lives by the locavore principle? Located in the upcoming area of Damansara Kim, UoVo's sister restaurant, Farm to Plate is committed to supporting local farmers and thrives on serving customers fresh local produce. Hence, if your diet only consists of locally-produced food, then this recently opened joint is soon to be your new best friend.

However, the specialty at Farm to Plate is the air-flown Spanish traditionally-cured meat (Iberico pork) from specially purebred Iberian pigs. Although they are determined to serve you local produce from Malaysian producers, it is impossible to get you Iberico pork as Iberian pigs are only bred in Portugal and Spain. Iberian pigs can be of pure or cross breed and are differentiated by their feeding process. To get the Iberico 100% Bellota, the pork has to come from purebred Iberian pigs which are bred from 100 percent Iberian parents. To understand them better, they are similar to free-range chickens. Iberian pigs roam freely in the countryside of where they are bred and feed on acorns, which make their meat really tender because of the rich nutrients absorbed through the oil from the acorns.

Fret not, this joint does serve pizza and pasta dishes to suit those who are not fans of pork ribs or for those who prefer more food. Here's what we got to try:



Farm to Plate Salad

Pork Ribs

It's safe to say that the pork ribs here are the best I've ever tasted; they're finger lickin' good. We tried the high- and fast-cooked ribs which were ready for us to just bite and chew off the bone, served with a side of Shoyu & Sake sauce. The meat was surprisingly extremely tender, juicy and chewable. Like no other ribs I've ever tasted nor seen, the Iberico pork ribs here have pinkish/red meat, are rich in flavour and thick in size. Compared to other ribs that are often overflowing with sauce, the sauce here is served on the side for you to actually taste the meatiness of the pork ribs. Other flavours

on offer are the Salt and Pepper Ribs and the Smoked Pimento Ribs. You have the option of having your ribs either slow-cooked (if you prefer them to be extraordinarily tender) or cooked on high heat and grilled quickly with flavours bursting out of the ribs. The Smoked Pimento Ribs are traditionally smoked for long hours before being cooked to perfection in the oven to give you subtle woody and smoky aroma and flavour. Honestly, considering the size of their serving, the Iberico Pork Ribs are really worth the money at RM79.

Farm to Plate Salad

Made with locally-grown vegetables sourced from Malaysian farms such as in Cameron Highlands, it is a dish filled with natural ingredients, not overpowered by drizzling sauces, which allows you to taste the freshness and natural flavours from every bite. Served with sensational cherry tomatoes, crunchy cucumber, hard-boiled eggs with a light dash of mayonnaise, vinaigrette, mustard and sprinkled with parmesan cheese, this dish of overflowing freshness needs to be your side dish or starter.

Pizzas & Pastas

Try their Italian-inspired pizzas such as the King Mushroom with Truffle Oil and the Ham and Caramelised Onions with their daily freshly made pizza dough. As for their pastas, while we are not fans of tomato-based pastas, we actually loved their Conchiglie with Tomato Cream. As tomato-based pastas are often sharp and rich in flavour, this happened to be subtle and light without the excessive burst of sourness. However, the Fettuccine with Creamy

Mushroom was our gold medal winner – deliciously thick and creamy complemented with the sweetness from the caramelised onions, chewy button mushrooms and minty parsley.

House-brewed Coffee

While their focus is very much on their ribs and food, they also place strong emphasis on their in-house brewed coffee. We got to try their Iced White Coffee served in a tall vase-like bottle; the colour combination of the unstirred coffee together with the milk and ice cubes will draw you towards it at a glance.

Bottled beers are also served here, as they believe that beer and ribs go so well together.

Desserts

All desserts served here come from their pastry chef at UoVo, who makes uniquely flavoured meringues and other delights.

Parking may be difficult in the day but is not something to be worried about in the evenings. This joint is open seven days a week from 11am to 11pm.

It was a nostalgic experience to walk through the once famous Heritage Row area which was a nightlife haven before Changkat. Though I was relieved to see what has become of it, a row of 1940's shophouses that have now turned into a neighbourhood of innovative and independent offices, cafes, bars, shops and an exciting event space. Timbre @ The Row stands out being located just at the entrance across Quill

City Mall with its divine layout that can be appreciated even from a distance.

You probably think this rings a bell, especially if you frequent the top spots for dining and nightlife. That is because Timbre @ The Row is the first regional outpost and sixth live music venue that is brought by the Timbre Group of Singapore. Just like its sister venues in Singapore, the design in Timbre @ The Row inspires a welcoming and comfortable setting that is ideal for you to just relax and unwind. Perusing the menu – an Ipad found under the table (impressive) we found that the dishes are made for sharing and including the famous Roasted Duck Pizza, completed with popiah skin toppings that is all the rage with their patrons in Singapore. Trying it out, we found ourselves equally engrossed with it.

They also successfully developed a nasi lemak inspired pizza named the Crispy Caramel Anchovies that unites the local flavours with our go-to comfort food choice. I was particularly a big fan of their sambal that had an acceptable level of spiciness to match the overall flavour of the slice. One of the other highlights of the night was the Rack of Sambal Crusted Lamb Loin. The robust flavour of the perfectly cooked lamb loin with the heatiness of the sambal was a decadent dining experience that would

elevate any occasion. The mere thought of the juiciness of the lamb loins induces a mouth-watering effect. Even the Coconut Cream Mussels served with toasted ciabatta was sublime. Cocktail fans would surely enjoy the signature Timbre cocktail for an invigorating minty flavor.

Hospitality is certainly not as a matter of fact here. Expect courteous and professional hosts who are happy to accommodate your needs. As beautiful music filled the vast space – able to accommodate 200 people, we decided to order chocolate fondant to sweeten the experience. The presentation was rather quirky but the smell was serious business. Somehow, my fork swiftly ended up breaking apart the sponge-like exterior to reveal its gooey goodness. The gobsmacking pairing of butterscotch sauce with berries and the chocolate has definitely closed the deal for me to revisit in my own time.

What sets Timbre @ The Row aside other than excellent culinary offerings is the commitment to develop local music talents through nightly performances from Wednesday to Saturday with genres ranging from acoustics to head-bobbing rock numbers. An alternative dining experience awaits you at The Row, and great pizza. Need I say more?

If you like bread, cereal, potato chips, fries ...

READ THIS

They're tasty! That's for sure. We opt for these grain-based foods on our cheat days, and let's face it – we deserve it! Even if nutritionists and scientists insist that we adapt a more Paleo lifestyle (because, all things considered, humans never had carbohydrate-laden meals during the stone age or earlier). Come agricultural days, we (particularly Asians) are fond of our bread, chips and fries. However, keep an open mind and read on about how these foods contain:

Carcinogenic acrylamides

The word carcinogenic is as daunting as you imagine, and you may have heard of the word 'acrylamides' but you may not know which foods contain high amounts of this carcinogen. First, let's run through how acrylamides came to be. They are created mostly from starchy foods that have been subjected to high temperatures.

We'd hate to burst your bubble, but they're mainly found in your most favourite of things – deep-fried starchy food such as potato chips,

French fries, crackers, bread, corn chips and pretzels ... the list goes on as any starchy food that goes through baking, roasting, toasting or frying is the biggest culprit here.

However, acrylamides are not found in foods that are cooked with water, so they are found most in your golden toasted bread and roasted cereals and the likes. So although those near-burnt, delicious-smelling golden-brown crusts are good to



the eye and taste buds, they contain the most carcinogens.

So what does that mean for French fries and chips lovers? Sorry, they also contain one of the highest – in any form of potatoes, really.

How?

It is thought that an amino acid (found in starchy food) changes its form after grilling, frying, baking or roasting above 120 degrees Celcius (248 degrees Fahrenheit), eventually becoming a cancer-causing agent. Boiling and steaming produce far less, though.

The breakdown

- Potato chips - 546 micrograms/kg
- French fries - 698 micrograms/kg
- Breakfast cereal - 131 micrograms/kg
- Coffee - 8 micrograms/kg (although it is theorised that the antioxidants in coffee counter the carcinogens)

Women are found to have higher risks of endometrial and ovarian cancer after consuming 40 micrograms of acrylamides each day as opposed to those who do not. The equivalent of 40 micrograms of acrylamides is a small portion of potato chips.

But how can I give up my favourite things?

Nobody expects you to, and nobody can force you too. In all honesty, we ourselves wouldn't want to force ourselves to. Let's face it – we want to indulge. And we can – by countering it with antioxidants. Three antioxidants are crucial in countering the effects of acrylamides such as:

– **Polyphenols** are found in all types of tea – black tea, green tea, white tea, red tea, etc., but it is green tea and white tea that contain the highest levels of healthy polyphenols. With that in mind, it might be a good idea to drink high-antioxidant teas on the occasions that you are eating high-acrylamide foods.

Resveratrol is the famed antioxidant found in grape skin and red wine. It is also found in peanuts that have red skin, like Spanish peanuts. Again, you might hypothesise that a glass of red wine and the antioxidants within can help protect against the effects of foods with acrylamides.

Diallyl trisulfide is a compound found in fresh garlic that has been roasted, smashed or minced. Besides fighting off the bad effects of acrylamides, it is also a potent immune system booster. All three of these compounds are also extremely effective antioxidants. –

However, we can't assume that other powerful antioxidants don't help, so be very cautious of what you eat and don't.

All in all, we just want to remind you that on your cheat days, while it's fine to indulge, make sure you wash it down with something else that's good for you such as green tea, white tea, oolong tea and rooibos tea.

CARPE VINUM

Seize the wine

Surely you'd agree with me when I say wine is truly one of the greatest perks of being an adult. Though as much as we appreciate wine, some of us are guilty of overindulgence. But what if I tell you that with intelligent habits, you can taste the most amazing wines and be amazingly fit? Better yet, what if you could live longer, more memorable lives on a diet rich with wine? Well I'll have you know that science has proven that wine possesses certain attributes that can lead to better health.

The antioxidants in red wine are called polyphenols. These polyphenols have been shown to prevent degenerative diseases, such as heart disease. Thanks to these properties, we know that wine can be part of a healthy diet. Resveratrol is one of the more studied polyphenols found in red wine, and you have most likely heard about it somewhere. Resveratrol improves heart health by lowering LDL cholesterol (the bad stuff) and prevents blood clot formation. LDL cholesterol is the culprit of plaque buildup in the arteries and eventually could result in heart disease. Resveratrol has other benefits beyond the heart. These benefits may be the result of resveratrol's ability to cross the blood-brain barrier. With this unique ability, resveratrol has shown the

ability to increase cerebral blood flow.

Studies have yet to prove improved cognitive function with the administration of resveratrol supplementation, but future research will help better understand the brain benefits of this awesome antioxidant. While you won't find yourself cooking with champagne, it's also important to note that the antioxidant properties aren't exclusive to red wine. Just because champagne isn't red, it doesn't mean it that doesn't also have some of the same heart-healthy benefits (red wine grapes are most commonly used to make champagne). The polyphenols in these grapes have been shown to remove nitric oxide from the blood, thus improving blood pressure and overall circulation. I'll drink to that!

As it turns out, red wine may be the closest thing we have to an anti-aging elixir. Recent studies by David Sinclair from Harvard Medical School have proven that resveratrol in red wines contributes to anti-ageing and life extension effects. While the research was encouraging, unfortunately, if one relied on red wine alone to gain the lasting effects found in studies of mice and rats, it would require drinking more than 60 liters a day. Regardless, experts do advise that

a glass of red wine daily will contribute to the effects. But before you run out and grab the first bottle you see at the mall, consider that every product with "resveratrol" on the label is not created equal.

Further research into the benefits of consuming a glass of red wine brought the French Paradox to our attention. The study was introduced to justify the reason for the longevity of the French people whose diet mostly consisted of rich cholesterol-laden fare such as butter, cheese, pate, croissants and pastries yet have the second lowest rate of heart disease in the world (second only to the long-living Japanese)? Red wine has long been the answer to this so-called 'French paradox'. Red wine is made with the skins and seeds of grapes, so has 9 to 10 times more of these natural chemicals than white wine. They give red wine its characteristic sharpness or bite (often referred to as "tannins").

It goes without saying that moderation is key for indulgence but it is especially applicable when alcohol is involved. Also, I'd like to kindly advise you to seek out a certified nutritionist to make sure you can go ahead with that glass of wine. Other than that treat you are welcomed to unwind with a glass of wine – life is too short to give up the good stuff.

IN GOOD CONDITION

Much ado about shampoo

If you were challenged to give up your shampoo for two whole weeks in favour of cleansing conditioners, would you do it? As women, we are accustomed to lathering, rinsing and repeat; ditching shampoo is an unmistakably huge step to take.

This challenge is now a trend, a term dubbed "co-washing" (short for conditioner washing). Straightforward enough, the word suggests that you entirely skip out on shampoo and head straight for the conditioner. Why is this co-washing business so huge now, you ask? Because they say, "You are eliminating all those harsh detergents, polymers, fillers and binders – basically all the things that strip your hair and remove the good things," says famous LA hairdresser Chaz Dean, whose line of conditioner products 'Wen' debuted in 1993. "By co-washing, you're cleansing with natural essential oils, botanicals and extracts."

IS CO-WASHING FOR YOU?

All experts including celebrity stylists have agreed that co-washing works best if you have thick, coarse, dry or curly hair. If you have thin and fine hair, give this a miss as co-washing will not give added texture and instead will make the hair flatter and oilier. BAN THE BAG

Selangor bans use of plastic bags and polystyrene containers

We now have three months to clean up our act. Starting January 2017, Selangor will ban the use of polystyrene containers and extend the No Plastic Bag Day on Saturdays to every day of the week. As of last month, all official events and buildings of the Selangor state government stopped using plastic bags and polystyrene, to start this new green trend.

“The current 20-sen charge to buy a plastic bag on Saturdays as part of the No Plastic Bag Day campaign will be extended to every day of the week while polystyrene containers will be banned,” said Elizabeth Wong, State Green Technology and Environment Committee Chairman. The new ban will be enforced through the by-laws of each council (four – Shah Alam, Petaling Jaya, Subang Jaya and Sepang), where those applying or renewing their trading licences must agree to not using polystyrene and giving out plastic bags for free. While the government is in the midst of urging the remaining local councils and the public to follow suit, let's have a look at why we should, be reminded that:



They never truly degrade

They never break down, especially petroleum-based ones. What does occur is that they break down into tiny pieces that end up in the ocean, consumed by wildlife. A research on plasticbagfree.org by Rebecca Hosking stated that there are, at present, an estimated amount of 46, 000 to 1, 000 000 plastic fragments floating within every square mile of our world's oceans.

They travel and pollute

Because they're so lightweight, water and wind make them travel long distances. In the end, they do much damage from littering our landscapes to getting caught in trees and gates and floating in sewers.

They poison

Animals are most affected by this, as the pieces are often mistaken for food. This can lead to infections and ultimately, death by suffocation. Some animals also get entangled in them. Humans too are affected, as plastic bags can absorb pollutants like PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyl) and PAHs (polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons), which are known to be hormone-disrupting chemicals.

They are made from non-renewable resources and contribute to climate change

Made from polypropylene (which is made from petroleum and natural gas), these materials are non-renewable and are fossil fuel-based. Through their extraction and production, they create greenhouse gases.

They score low on the recycling rate

Most recycling facilities do not have the capacity to recycle plastic bags and do not accept them. The actual recycling rate for plastic bags is only 5 percent.

There are better alternatives

Once you get into the habit of bringing your own bags to shop for groceries and such, it wouldn't be much of a hassle. Reusable bags (especially those stacked around the house) can be used over and over.

Other people have started banning it, too

At present, more than 40 countries and municipalities around the world have implemented this ban. It's about time Malaysia does, too.

“Like many frequent flyers, I often breeze through bustling airports, taking safety for granted – or not even thinking about it in my busy schedule. But as air-travel booms, the issue of safety in airport-operations is growing. As custodians of the nation’s airports across the country, Malaysia Airports ensures that we abide strictly to the standards and safety regulations set by the Department of Civil Aviation (DCA) Malaysia. DCA is the regulatory body responsible for regulating aviation activities in order to ensure safe, efficient and smooth operation of air transportation in Malaysia.

“Did you know that KLIA was the first airport in the entire Asia Pacific region to establish the International Civil

Aviation Organisation’s Aerodrome Safety Management System? It’s true! As global aviation activities grow more complex, Malaysia Airports joined hands with the DCA as far back as 2009, and decided we needed to stay ahead of the game. Together, we adopted a more comprehensive method to better manage safety and risk by utilising the ICAO-ASMS.

“I’m pleased that currently, all our international and 11 domestic airports are ASMS-certified, meaning that they are fully compliant with ICAO’s highest standards of safety-management. Every airport in our portfolio has received all required safety certifications, including the Certificate of Completion and Compliance (CCC), ensuring that the terminal is safe for operations.

“In the case of our recently-completed facility klia2, we have obtained the Aerodrome Certificate certifying that the terminal complies with ICAO Annex 14 and Airport Standards Directive for its runway, parking apron, taxiways, terminal building structures and surrounding areas. These measures were undertaken in order to ensure that the entire facility remains safe and fit for operations, because we take our responsibility towards public safety very seriously.

“Part of the ASMS Certification requirement includes the formation of Runway Safety Teams. Overall, the global aviation industry has a remarkable safety





record, with fewer than four accidents per million departures on average worldwide. Nonetheless, improvements to runway safety are essential. Through its Runway Safety Teams (RST), ICAO aims to coordinate a global effort to further improve global safety. The ICAO's Runway Safety Team takes the multidisciplinary approach in collaborating with stakeholders such as the DCA Air Traffic Controllers, the pilots of airlines, and in our case, Malaysia Airports as the airports-operator.

"The ICAO-ASMS office provides guidance to, and necessary training for, all airport RSTs in accordance to ICAO standards. Currently, five of our international and 12 domestic airports have had their Runway Safety Teams established

"Malaysia Airports takes things further, beyond the ASMS. With our experience managing 39 airports of all sizes in this country and several in different parts of the world, we believe there must be a comprehensive, holistic system that integrates Safety, Health and Environment Management into a dynamic and effective operation. We are committed to operate our airports and other business-units in full compliance with national and international statutory and regulatory requirements through a Safety, Health and Environment Management System (SHEMS) that benefits airport-users, employees, customers, vendors, and the public.

"In summary, may I say that I firmly believe that Safety is not simply a target to be achieved, but rather a continuous process that is the constant and consistent way we operate at all times. Most of all, safety is not just the duty of a few individuals, but the responsibility of every single one of us at the airports – visitors, travellers, and staff. And the message I have for all is, "Stay well, and travel safe!"





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Smoother Flights with Regulations and Rights

Malaysia Airports facilitates air-travel for airlines and passengers.



Since its advent in 1944, Commercial Aviation has always been carefully governed by various laws and regulations drawn up by national and international organisations and governmental agencies. With the unprecedented boom in air-travel in this millennium, and with the rapid rise of factors like new technology, commercialisation, mass-travel, security concerns and safety issues, airlines have to deal with what can appear to be a complex labyrinth of rules, regulations and procedures. In Malaysia, airlines can turn to Malaysia Airports to help facilitate their operations into, over, and from this country by connecting them to various key organisations.

Generally, the Malaysian aviation sector is regulated by the **Department of Civil Aviation (DCA)** under the **Ministry of Transport (MOT)**, including airport-access and related services. The Ministry of Transport is a keen advocate of the Open Skies policy that grew with the spread of liberalisation in the 1990's. The policy of the Malaysian Government is to welcome airlines from every corner of the world to turn-around, hub or transit at our airports. International airlines will be glad to know that the Ministry of Transport is committed to encourage more air-travel into and out of Malaysia with its Roadmap for Integration of Air Travel.

It has been working towards the adoption of more liberal aviation policies especially within the ASEAN countries in careful stages that would eventually create full liberalisation for all ASEAN members, with a unified aviation market

and less restrictive operating environment for airlines within the ASEAN region. Airlines need good airports, and the Ministry of Transport works with Malaysia Airports to ensure that world-class facilities are constantly upgraded at all of our international gateways so that carriers get the very best possible. It maintains the highest standards of safety and security while striving to keep costs extremely competitive.

As a prominent leader of the Department of Civil Aviation said a couple of years ago, "We are fully mindful of the fact that airlines are the reason airports exist in the first place, and for airports to be successful, the airline-partners must be our priority. In the bigger governmental picture, Malaysia also knows the importance of good air-connectivity for the growth and development of commerce, industry and tourism. As such, airlines seeking to develop new routes in the region should look at Malaysia's commitment to the policy of Open Skies for aviation. Further, our position in the ICAO is an excellent demonstration of the excellent standing that Malaysia has in the international aviation community."

The **International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO)** is a United Nations agency established in 1944 to manage the administration and governance of the Convention on International Civil Aviation. Working with the Convention's 191 Member Nations and industry groups, ICAO recognises the rights or privileges, in respect of scheduled





international air services, granted by one Nation to another Nation to fly across the skies of its territory or land in within its borders. An Air Traffic Right Certificate (ATRC) is required for these privileges.

In Malaysia, ATRCs are awarded by the **Malaysian Aviation Commission (MAVCOM)** which was formally established on 1 March 2016 as an independent entity to regulate economic and commercial matters related to civil aviation in Malaysia. Malaysia currently maintains over 100 Air Service Agreements (ASA) with other countries. MAVCOM takes a range of conditions into account when allocating ATRC, including public demand and the interests of air-transport users (passengers, cargo customers); quality of service, and economic viability of the proposed flights; competition levels, particularly on international routes; impact on Malaysia's airports and the aviation industry; and environmental or social effects.

All these organisations work together to build a clear and strong legal framework of rules, regulations and rights within which airlines can operate safely and efficiently. On a more specific level, high volumes of international traffic necessitated some form of organisation for aircraft to land and take-off at busy airports. A landing slot or takeoff slot is a right granted by an airport-owner which



allows the slot holder to schedule a landing or departure on a specific time period.

From 1947, airlines met regularly, under the auspices of the **International Air Transport Association (IATA)**, to discuss their timetables planned for the following season. With about 265 member-airlines from 117 countries in every part of the globe, IATA supports airline activity and helps formulate industry policy and standards. IATA is often known as the voice of the aviation industry, launching a number of important programs and lobbying governments on behalf of the airline industry. In the context of commercial aviation, IATA works for safety, security, the environment, training, education, and operational efficiency. It is in this last matter that slot-coordination comes up.

In Malaysia, the DCA appointed Malaysia Airports to steward **National Slot Coordination Malaysia (NSCM)**. Working under IATA's Worldwide Slot Guidelines,

NSCM ensures slots are allocated to airlines and other aircraft operators in a neutral, transparent, and non-discriminatory way.

Airports Council International (ACI) is the only global trade-representative of the world's airports. Established in 1991, ACI represents airports interests with Governments and international organizations such as ICAO, develops standards, policies and recommended practices for airports, and provides information and training opportunities to raise standards around the world. Malaysia Airports works closely with ACI to implement ACI's Airport Service Quality (ASQ); the world-renowned global benchmarking programme measuring passengers' satisfaction whilst they are travelling through an airport.

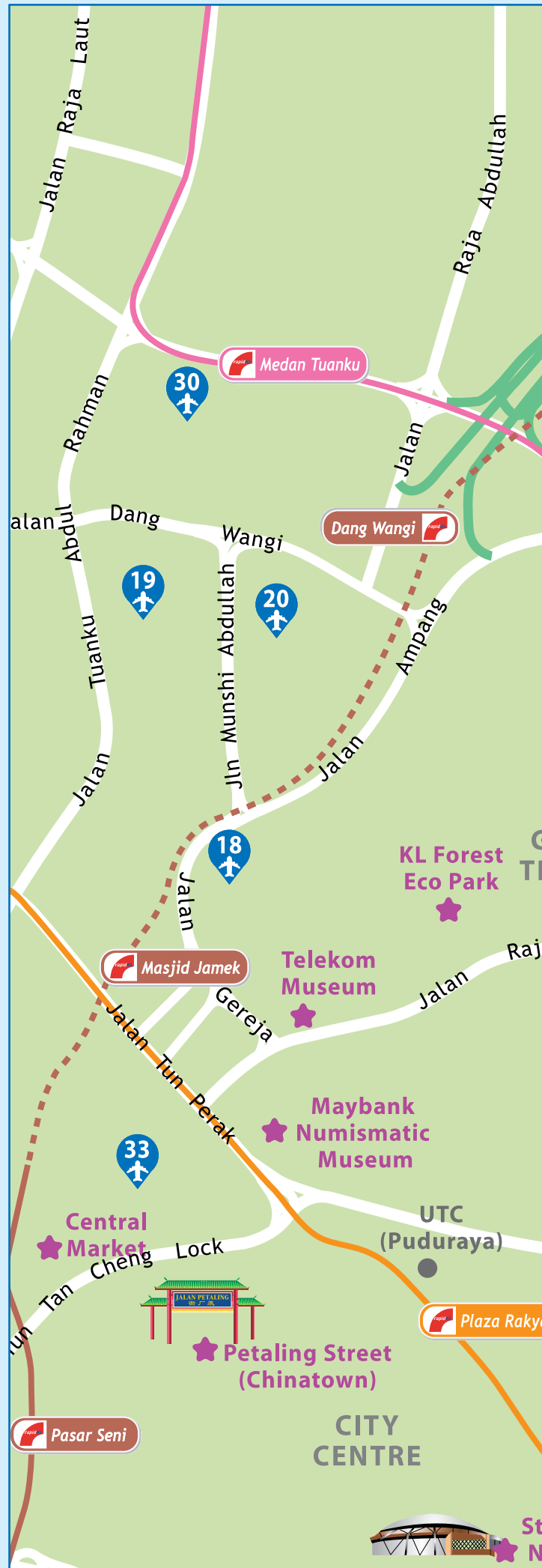

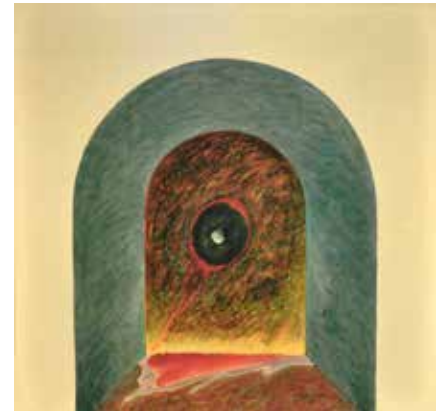

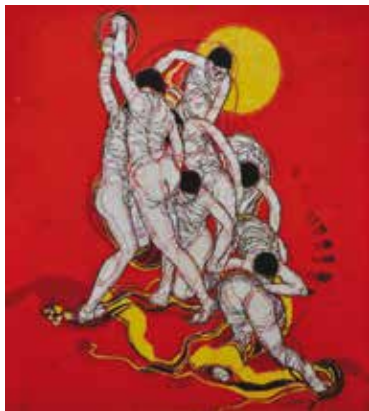

ART EXPO MALAYSIA PLUS 2016

Gear up for the largest, most significant and prestigious international visual art feast in Malaysia – Art Expo Malaysia The 10th edition of this yearly art fair will take place from Oct 20–23, at Matrade Exhibition and Convention Centre (MECC), Kuala Lumpur, featuring 60 established and reputable art galleries / groups from 30 countries. Exhibited will be 2,000 pieces of artworks (including paintings, sculptures, installations, photography) in various styles, expressions and mediums, under one roof.

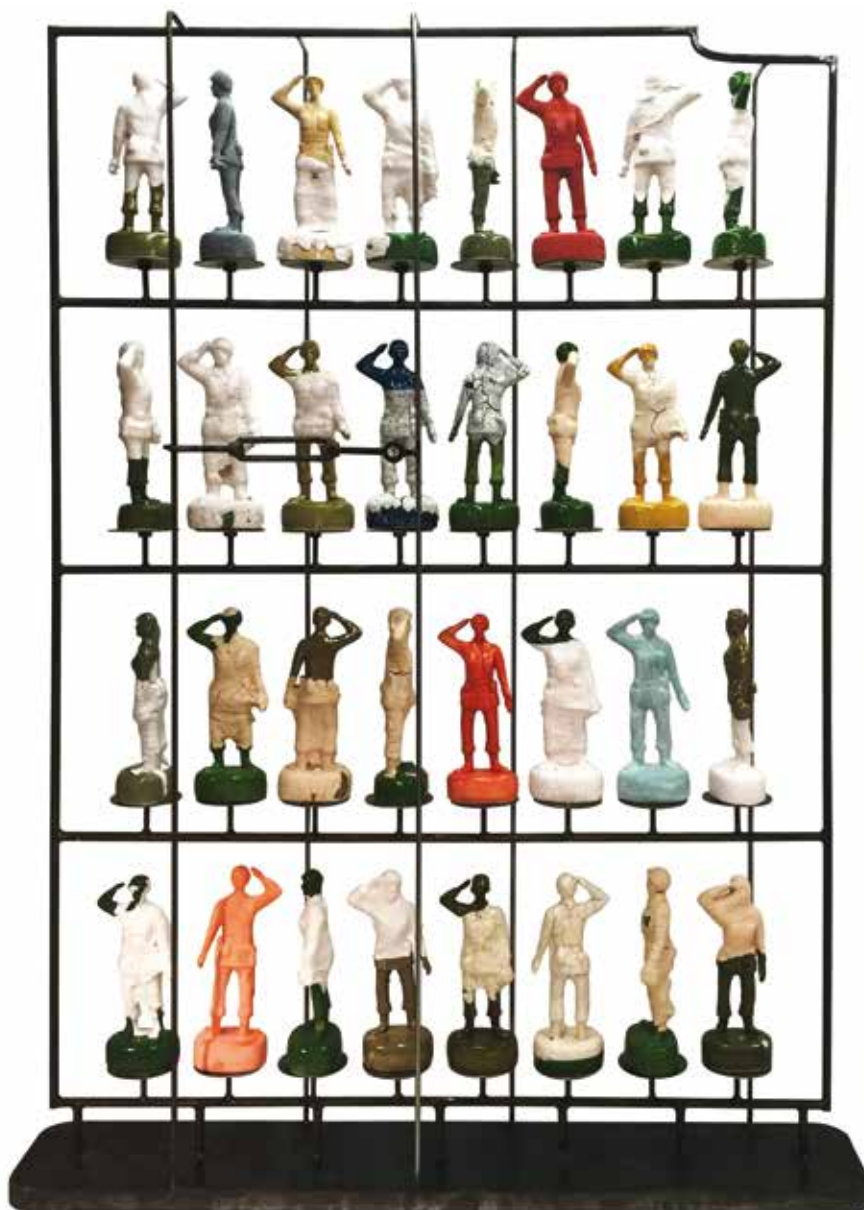
Currently the longest-running art fair in Southeast Asia, Art Expo Malaysia is probably the most public-friendly art fair in the world, as it does not charge any entrance fee since its inception in 2007! (entering an art fair in Singapore would cost the equivalent RM80, and in Hong Kong it would cost about RM135)

The Malaysia bandwagon, the largest delegation, will have a good number of reputable exhibitors as well as new players in the local art scene. These galleries will represent more than 100 local artists, a

great mix of pioneer artists, superstars, established and emerging young artists. The Malaysian works usually receive good response and remarks from visitors. With a strong pool of local collectors specifically collecting Malaysian art, it is expected that the sales of the artworks would be excellent.

Singapore Representation

From our neighbouring country Singapore, as many as 8 galleries are participating, forming the second largest exhibitor group. It is common that galleries in Singapore represent artists of various

nationalities. Art Xchange Gallery mainly represents Indonesian artists; ArtBlue Studio (Vietnamese artists) and Kato Art Duo (Japanese artists). REDSEA Gallery used to showcase works by French, Russian, and Spanish artists, but will be debuting with Korean and Indonesian works this round.

Foreign Exhibitors

From other parts of Southeast Asia, Myanmar is represented by Colour Cube Art Gallery, a first-time participant; Thailand by Number 1 Gallery; Vietnam by Viet Art Space, debut appearance in this art fair; Indonesia by REDBASE Contemporary

Art, also a first-time participant, which will be showcasing an amazing interesting sculpture at the main entrance of the exhibition hall (you will be impressed!)

Asian exhibitors include Hong Kong's Chit Fung Art that represents Chinese ink masters such as Jia Youfu, Pan Gongka, etc) While Korea's Zoom Gallery, in collaboration with Nine Gallery, presents fascinating works of strong Korean identity. From Japan, besides the frequent exhibitor LSD Gallery, two other galleries, namely Gallery UG and SHINSEIDO, will be joining for the first time.

From Taiwan, the 91-year-old Taiwanese Chinese ink grandmaster Prof Li Chi Mao will be exhibiting few pieces of recent works.

Spain's ATR Gallery booth is always a visitors' all-time-favourite booth. Be mesmerised by the latest works of Spanish sculptor Jesus Curia, and pieces by Spanish master Joan Miro, and if lucky enough, not sold yet, pieces by Picasso!

There will also be an Embassy Zone, which will see the participation of 13 embassies, i.e. Argentina, Belgium, Brazil, Colombia, Cuba, France, Iran, Italy, Mexico, Mongolia, Philippines, Romania, Russia (debut appearance). Each embassy represents one selected solo artist from its country.

In addition, there will be the National Exhibition of China, presented by the Ministry of Culture China, showcasing 3 to 4 Chinese contemporary ink artists, at a huge exhibition area of 420 sqm. On the other hand, the usual China Pavilion will shrink down in size, having 5 different groups participating only, so that China's representation isn't too overwhelming.

Art Expo Malaysia is under the royal patronage of Crown Prince and Crown Princess of Perlis, DYT M Tuanku Syed Faizuddin Putra ibni Tuanku Syed Sirajuddin Jamalullail and DYT M Tuanku Hajah Lailatul Shahreen Akashah Khalil.

Fair director Sim Pojinn said, "Art Expo Malaysia promotes Malaysian Art at an international platform, promoting local galleries and artists worldwide, educating the public about art appreciation and art investment, promoting art to a wider community (via intensive marketing), thus nurturing interest towards arts in them, bolstering Kuala Lumpur as an important art hub in Southeast Asia that is active in art commerce and art development, as well as networking within the community. Following last year's success of recording RM 16.9 million in sales of artworks and a visitorship of 24,200 people, we hope to achieve greater success while we improve from different aspects."

Where are you from? Tell us about your hometown.

I am from Beijing, China. I was born and raised there. People call us the "The Beijinger". Beijing is a massive city with a huge population. The city has been changing rapidly over the years. Every time I go back, it looks different, but it is able to maintain its cultural heritage. I am sure you know about the Summer Palace and Forbidden City. The most famous food there, of course, is Peking Duck.

Tell us a bit about your background.

I am always into fashion since I was in middle school. I spent a lot of time exploring what was new in the fashion world through magazines, online, movies and TV series. However, I was not able to choose any fashion-related major during my university days. Over the years I have slowly developed the skills on how to be a fashionista. I also discovered that having a good sense of fashion doesn't mean it always needs to cost you an arm and a leg. Fashion needs to fit your personality to make it work.

When did you come to Malaysia? What was your first impression?

My first time to Malaysia was for a holiday about 9 years ago. I fell in love with KL when I first visited here. I think it was love at first sight. Since I was raised in a big city, I would always enjoy the crowds and the cosmopolitan feeling of KL. The multi-cultural aspect always attracts me. The federal capital has its own personality. On the other hand, Malaysia is blessed with so many beautiful islands, especially in Sabah. I have family members and friends who constantly go there for holidays.

What do you do and how did you get into it?

I am a freelance stylist/personal shopper, and I also have an office job. I can't recall exactly when people started to ask me about what to buy, or how did I make my hair. There are a lot of times when I walk on the

street, people would randomly approach me to ask where I bought my shoes or my dresses. Then I thought it might be a good opportunity to make it as a business. I started my own website (www.gracecao.co), then eventually had customers. Most of the time I help people who don't know how to dress up, or people who have no idea on what to wear for functions or events. My clients are not actors or actresses; they are ordinary people like me who want to have a better look. I regularly blog to update my readers on the latest trends in the fashion industry.

What is it that you love about what you do?

To help people become confident and feel good about themselves motivates me the most. I feel very happy when my clients are looking great. After all "you are what you wear".

Do you eat the local food here? Any favourites?

I eat the local food everyday. In fact I cannot even think of one food that I don't like in Malaysia. Hainanese Chicken Rice is definitely one of my favourites and ironically, it's not originally from Hainan, China! Another food I love is the nasi lemak from Petronas station! Strange? You have to try it when you are starving.

How is your interaction with the locals?

I think it's such a blessing that I can naturally blend in with the people here and even my friends think that I am too local already. China and Malaysia are very close and the history goes way back. I have made good friends in Malaysia, and I keep meeting amazing people here. Malaysians are definitely one of the most patient people in the world.

What are the five things that an expatriate can take advantage of by living in Malaysia?

The medical facilities here are superb and affordable. There are plenty of interesting

and beautiful places to visit. Shopping is great and it can suit anyone's budget. Make as many local friends as possible because they will help you see the different sides of Malaysia. Finally, Malaysia is pretty much the centre of Southeast Asia, making it a hub to travel around the region.

Have you got any funny/interesting stories that have happened while you're here?

I attended Bahasa Malaysia class when I first moved here. I love languages and it is also quite natural for me wanting to learn the language. All my classmates were expats too and we always shared interesting stories of our own countries. We had so much fun, and at the same time we learnt the local language.

Another interesting thing for me is that people always think that I am from Korea. This happens almost everyday. When I am in the shopping mall, the shop assistants will try to say "Hello" in Korean to me. If I go to a Korean restaurant, the Korean boss would be speaking Korean to me as well. There was even a case of someone dancing Gangnam Style when he saw me.

I would just explain to them that I am from China and normally they would say that I do not look Chinese and Chinese people don't usually speak good English. I was wondering what do people think how the Chinese are supposed to look like. Then I came to realise that this is an opportunity for them to know me as one of the young and modern generation of Chinese citizens who speaks good English, thinks freely and also loving her own country.

Your advice to people who would like to follow in your footsteps?

At this stage, I don't think I'm at the position to ask people to "follow my footsteps" just yet but I hope that I am already on my way to success. I would encourage everyone, especially women, to do what they really like and devote themselves to it.

The bicycles are made by riders for riders that focus on the rider's need for functional and technically advanced products which provide a performance benefit. Widely known as the bikes that created the endurance road category, they feature proprietary technologies that will redefine comfort, speed and handling. Specialized worked closely with McLaren to understand what "smooth" actually meant.

Together, they analysed how riders and road surfaces interact, learning to quantify smoothness in order to increase speed and reduce road vibrations transmitted to the rider. This allows the bike to float under the rider's hands and is not only smoother but also proven to be faster over rough roads. The Future Shock also features three different spring rates, allowing retailers to customise the rider experience based on customer preference. In addition to the Future Shock, the bikes feature the CG-R seatpost and the new Drop Clamp, which allows 20mm of rearward arc compliance. The S-Works Ruby and Roubaix will come with Specialized's latest road offering, the Roval CLX 32 wheels, which are lighter, more aerodynamic, and have less rolling resistance than the previous CLX 40 wheels.

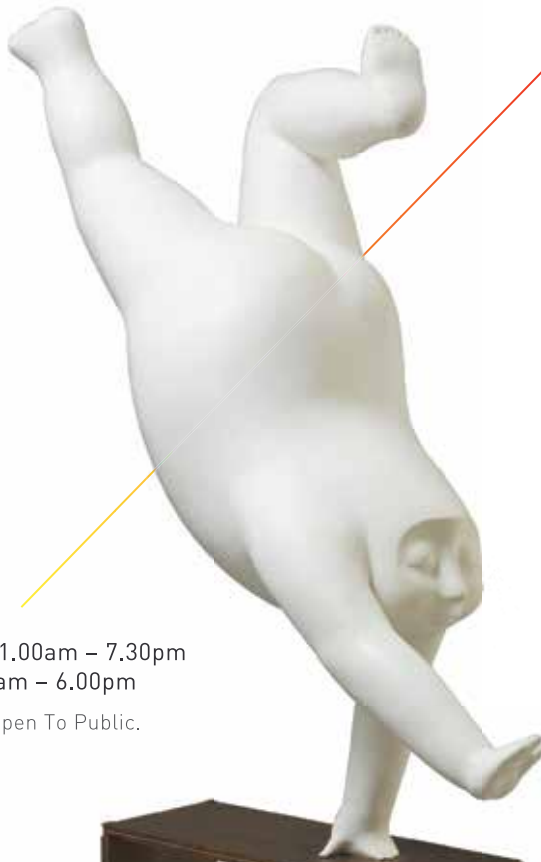
Pro and S-Works models also feature a SWAT™ Box storage system that fits seamlessly above the bottom bracket, providing the most logical place to hold items for flat repair. Each frame size has been individually developed for the respective rider, rather than the traditional approach of building the median size and just making larger and smaller versions of the same frame. 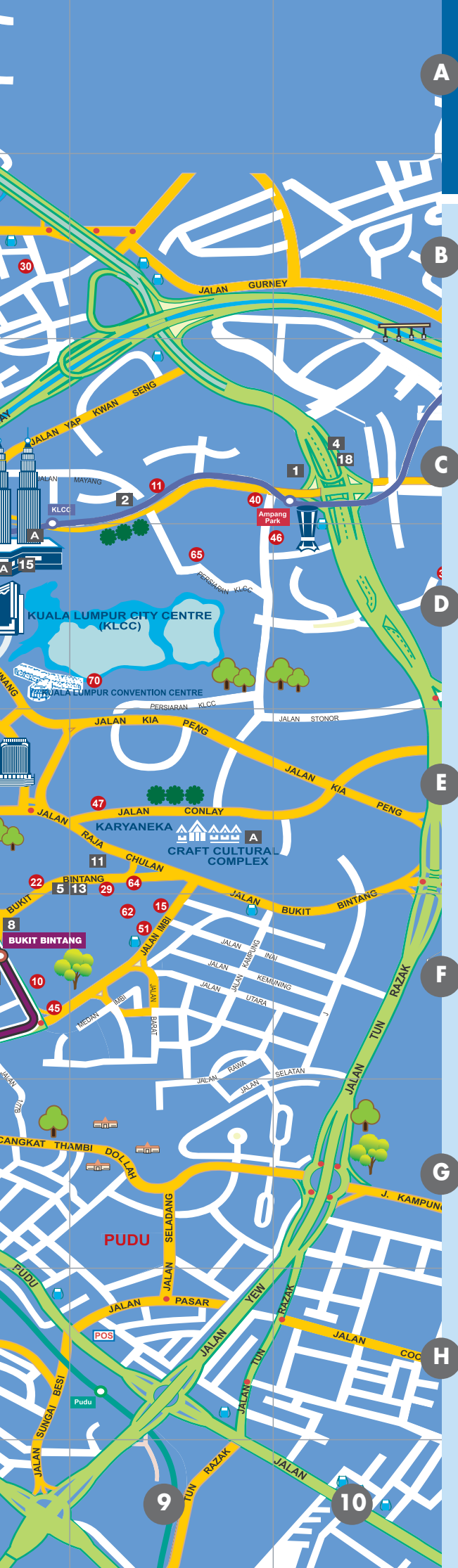

Getting around in Kuala Lumpur is easy. The transit systems are efficient, taxis are plenty and buses are cheap. The public transportation usage peak hours are from 7am to 9am and 4.30pm to 6.30pm during the working days.

By Transit systems

The KL monorail and LRT coaches are air-conditioned and comfortable and run from 6am to midnight. The systems are connected to each other at several points and the network covers most parts of the city. Fares range from RM0.70 to RM2.80 per single journey.

By Taxis

Taxis are easily available at hotels or at taxi stands. Fares start at RM3 for the first kilometre and RM0.10 for every 115 metres thereon. There is a 50% surcharge on the metered fare from midnight to 6am and a baggage charge of RM1 per piece stored in the boot. There is also an additional RM1 for 3rd passenger (maximum 4 in a car). For an extra charge of RM2, you can book a taxi by phone.

By Ecovans

Ecovans can accommodate up to 5 passengers. They serve mainly guests at major hotels and follow the fare structure of taxis but charge RM4 instead of RM2 for the first kilometre.

By Buses

Buses serve all parts of Kuala Lumpur with fares beginning from RM1. Some hotels also offer free bus shuttle services to major shopping malls in the city.

KL Hop-on/Hop-off Bus Service

Getting to the Airport

KLIA Ekspres: The journey takes about 30 minutes from KL Sentral and the fare is RM35 per person per way. There is also check-in facility at KL Sentral for some airlines.

Taxi: The fare from the city centre to the airport is RM60 – RM90 per taxi.

Eco Transit: Eco Transit can accommodate up to 5 adults and has a fixed fare of RM130/ trip.

Limousine: Can be arranged with the hotel concierge and fare range from RM100 – RM200.

Coaches To KLIA and/or LCCT

The 1-hour journey costs between RM9 and RM25 per person.
