

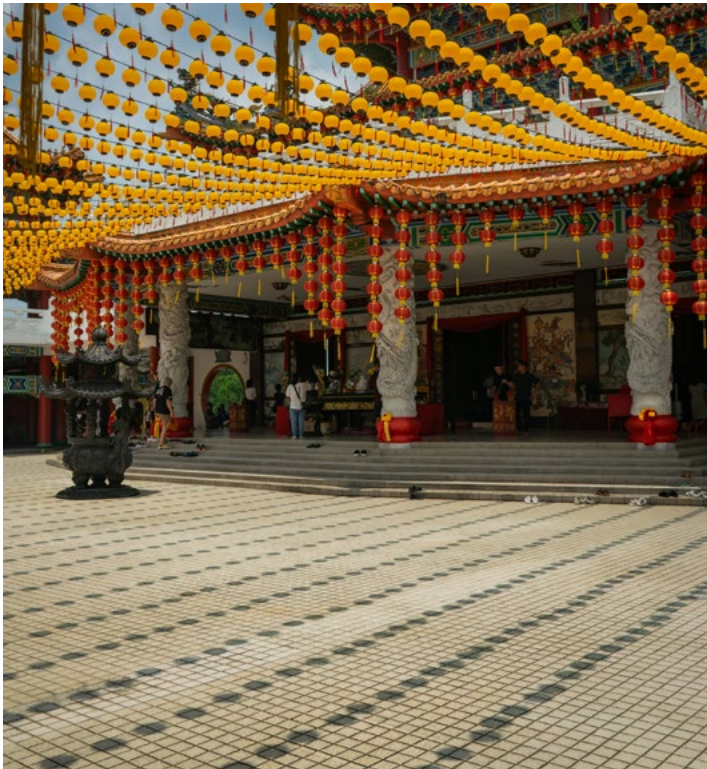
Discovering the Hidden Charms of the Federal Territories

Surrounding the alley are an array of charming cafes and boutique shops, each contributing to the area's unique blend of old-world charm and modern creativity.

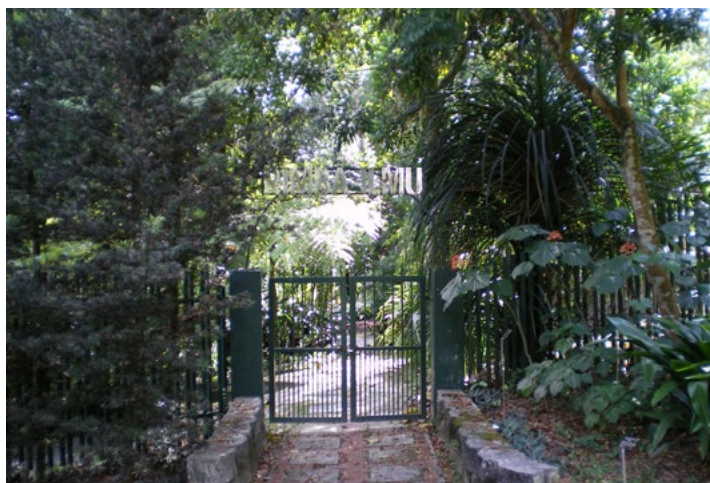

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Putrajaya: Uncovering Its Quiet Charm

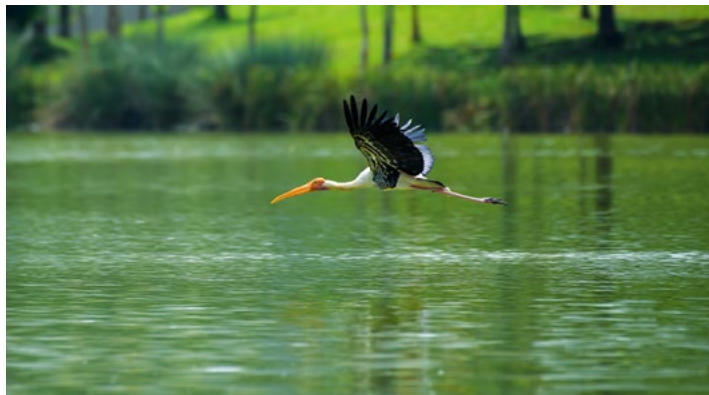

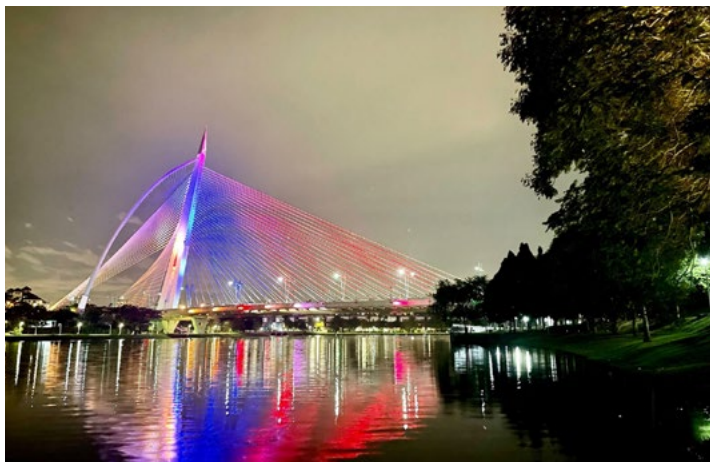


Moroccan Pavilion (Astaka Morocco)

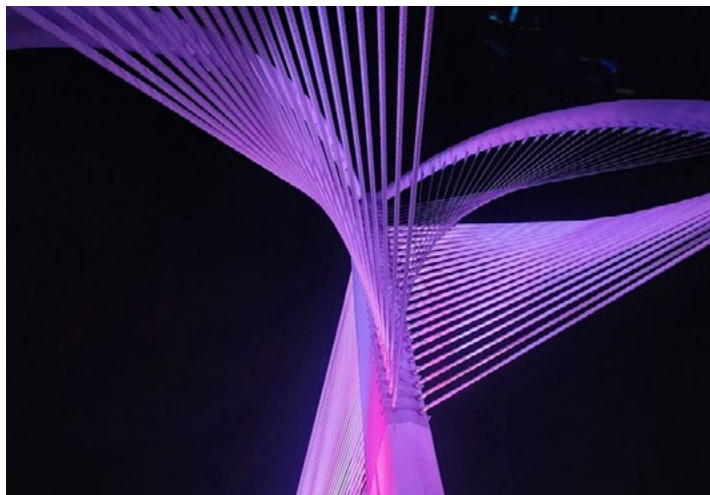




Seri Wawasan Bridge Night Lights
